Engage in inter-generational collaboration with a specific focus on the most marginalized.

Analyze, develop and implement policies that mandate adolescent participation in institutional settings.



Develop accountability mechanisms to ensure action based on children's including adolescents' voices.

ASPIRE! MOOC – Learning strategies

VIDEO-BASED



The ASPIRE! course has over 100 short videos of adolescents and officials who share their stories and good practices.

INTERACTIVE



MCQs, reflection exercises, journal exercises and components such as "hot spots" enable constant learner interaction in the learning process.

PROMOTES ACTION



The course encourages reflection, unlearning, new learning and action throughout.




MOOC – Unique frameworks example 1: ASPIRE!
